

More is better. The main concert area is a bit cavernous, so we need you to bring all your friends and everyone else you know. The VFW will have a taco bar, and you can order off the menu. They have a good beer selection along with a full bar. There is lots of onsite parking.

We have a fabulous array of bands and jam leaders who have volunteered their time and talents. There will be impromptu jamming wherever folks can find a nook or cranny. Once again, we will hold a silent auction. Please donate music related items, services, tickets, gift cards, arts/crafts, jewelry, or whatever. The lineup in the order of their appearances are the following ensembles:



Kim Harrington and Helen Miltich will kick things off. They have been singing together for the past few years. Kim and Helen love songs that feature harmony. They do not confine themselves to any particular genre. Kim is a fine fingerstyle guitar player and performed for many years with the late Donny LaPlant.

In their 20th year, Monroe Crossing has played approximately 2300 shows in 42 states, three Canadian provinces, and

eight countries on three continents. Barry St. Mane will be joining them on banjo, featuring his fine melodic style. Highly entertaining, they bring great energy, musicianship, and vocals to every show.

A new band, Sponsored by Lloyd, follows Monroe Crossing. Sponsored by Lloyd is a mirepoix of young people who have been blessed to know Lloyd LaPlant and were subsequently "sponsored" with his instruments and humor over the years. Starring Emily LaPlant, Elizabeth (Ophoven) Ashworth, and Jake Ashworth. The band also contains one slightly older member, John Bodle, who happens to have known Lloyd longer than the young ones have been alive (but not by too much). All members are true fans of Lloyd and enjoy playing all sorts of music together - sometimes even with Lloyd dabbling in bluegrass, swing, blues, and all sorts of other creations.

Next up is King Wilkie's Dream. King Wilkie's Dream (KWD) does not worry about achieving a particular level of drive or meandering in the wilderness of rhythm and vibe. The band sets out to stretch musically and creatively, while entertaining in a way that transcends generations and connects with audiences. Bluegrass, blues, swing, Americana, country, tin pan alley, old time, and just a little pop are all represented in the music that you may hear from KWD. Whether it is an original song, a well-worn traditional number, or something from outside the genre of bluegrass, the tune receives the same

attention to detail, resulting in the band's New Sound, Big Noise.

The Double Down Daredevils bring their brand of death defying bluegrass to the Flannel Fundraiser this year at 5 pm. This six piece group goes beyond three chord standards to create a fun, high energy show with straight up bluegrass, Americana and a growing list of originals, delivered with signature harmonies that will leave you wanting more!

Taking their name from the classic Jimmie Roger's song, Blue Yodel No. 9 draws inspiration from the classic Country, Blues and Swing of Hank Williams, The Delmore Brothers, the "Bobs" (Wills and Dylan) and many others. Mixing bluesy, up-tempo numbers with a tasty blend of original tunes, the band features an eclectic set list, tight harmony and swinging instrumentation. The band's line-up includes: John Whitehead on vocals, guitar, mandolin and banjo; Ross Johnson on vocals, guitar and harmonica; and John Haer on upright bass and vocals. Lately, they've been kicking things up a notch with the addition of hot picker Paul Carlson on guitar.

Back Up and Push will close out the Flannel Fundraiser. Steeped in the music of first-generation bluegrass visionaries, the members of Back Up and Push bring a forceful and vibrant enthusiasm for tradition to the stage. Building on an instrumental repertoire that rests on a foundation of Baker fiddle tunes and banjo numbers from Stanley and Scruggs, the band injects audiences with a healthy dose of high lonesome harmonies that

hearken back to the classic duos: Bill and Lester, Carter and Ralph, Jim and Jesse. With an unapologetic passion for straight-forward and unvarnished traditional bluegrass, Back Up and Push brings authentic power and emotion to a stage show that can put a fire in your belly and a tear in your eye. Back Up and Push features Michael Prewitt on guitar and

features Michael Prewitt on guitar and vocals, AJ Srubas on fiddle, Rina Rossi on bass and vocals, and David Robinson on banjo and vocals. The organized jams include a bluegrass jam led by John Whitehead at 3:00, an old-time jam led by Rina Rossi at 5:00, and a ukulele jam led by Tony Antonison at 6:30. The silent auction will close at 7:50. See you then!

I have been lucky enough to meet a lot of my musical heroes. I have played on stage with Ricky Skaggs and Bobby Osborne. I hope to someday meet and play with Jesse McReynolds and Norman

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

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



My MBOTMA Story: Addie Rosenwinkel

Q: How has the Minnesota Bluegrass and Old-Time Music Association changed your life?

Addie: When I was a student at St. Olaf in Northfield, I took an independent study to write about folk music. My professor said, "There is this jam at the Crowne Plaza Hotel, and you should go and see what you're writing about." So, I just came up here and that's when I heard old-time music for the first time. I said to myself, "These are my people, and this is going to be my thing. This is the sound I care about."

Q: Would it have been the same thing as hearing a CD?

Addie: It was walking around and seeing the intimate circles of musicians. That's what really stuck with me.

Q: ... and then?

Addie: I had planned a trip for spring break trip, but instead of buy-

ing a plane ticket, I bought a banjo. I did not put that thing down. Over and over, I practiced the same simple thing. I was just trying to replicate the sound I heard. It's the drone and the rhythm that excites me. When I was there, I saw the Wild Goose Chase Cloggers perform and that blew me away — the dancing and music together. And now I play in the band that plays for the cloggers. It was through the clogging scene I got hooked into the MBOTMA community. My life took a whole left turn into constant playing and performing. It started with friendships and now feels like family. It's pretty crazy what happened to my life. I took piano for many years but felt like I hadn't found my thing. Nothing was as gripping to me as the banjo.

Q: How did MBOTMA change your life?

Addie: One thing, I stay up, playing



way later than I would normally. ... and maybe I drink a little more.

Regional Scholarship Nutures New Cajun Musicians

For ten years, the John Hugelen Cajun Music Scholarship Fund has been energizing the Upper Midwest Cajun music scene by sponsoring budding musicians to learn Cajun-style music from the people who know it best: musicians from Southwest Louisiana. The Hugelen Fund committee holds an annual dance party in Minneapolis that raises money to send scholarship recipients to Cajun music camps. In the ten years since its inception, the annual fundraiser has raised over \$45,000.

The dance parties host great Louisiana Cajun musicians, such as Blake Miller, Brandon Moreau, David Greely, Jesse Lége, Jimmy Breaux, and Ray Abshire, all of whom traveled to Minnesota to be part of the annual event that memorializes a dear friend and musician, John "Iowa John" Hugelen, who died of cancer in 2009.

Iowa John's love of Cajun music and his generous spirit live on through this celebration and the Fund that encourages new musicians to dive into the music and culture at Cajun Weekend at Folklore Village in Dodgeville, WI, Cajun Week at Augusta Heritage Center in Elkins, WV, and/or Balfa Camp in Ville Platte, LA. All three camps allow participants to study fiddle, accordion, guitar, or vocals with masters of the Cajun music tradition.

Many of the Fund's 30 recipients have gone on to play in Cajun bands in the Twin Cities area, as well as in Louisiana. Past recipients include: AJ Srubas (Blake Miller & Old Fashioned Aces, New Riverside Ramblers), Amelia Biere (Blake Miller & Old Fashioned Aces), Katie-Ping Woods (Le Gran Fromage Cajun Band), Marie Stier (Roux LaLa, DL Cajun Band), Shawn Glidden (Roux LaLa, DL Cajun Band), as well as Aaron Tacke, Anabel Njoes, Angela Bowman, Andy Mattison, Anna Willms, Arne Pelto, Chris Anderson, Clive North, Elizabeth Voz, Ina Mae Edminster, Jeff Yonkus, Joshue Savoie,

The Carter Scratch

They didn't call her Mother Maybelle for nuthin.' Nope. In addition to being the mother of three girls (Helen, Valerie June, and Anita), Maybelle Carter certainly earned the title of Mother of Bluegrass

Guitar. Starting in 1927, her lead and rhythm guitar playing laid the foundation that was built upon by those who followed in her footsteps. Her signature lick on the guitar has been referred to as the Carter Scratch because of her way of playing the melody notes on the bass strings while vigorously strumming up and down on the treble strings of the guitar with her index finger. To some, it looked like she was scratching the strings, hence the name.

It is ironic that Maybelle played such a fundamental role in creating the guitar sound

known as flatpicking guitar, when she rarely, if ever, used a flat pick. Bill Clifton, who was one of the first bluegrass guitar players to feature the guitar as a lead instrument, was profoundly influenced by Maybelle's guitar style. Clifton shared with me that he assumed that she was using a flatpick because he learned from her records before seeing her play in person. It was only later, when he relocated near the Carter Family homeplace in southwest Virginia, that he realized his mistake, but he was too far along on the guitar to change now.

In searching for the roots of Maybelle's style of guitar playing, the name of an African-American musician named Lesley Riddle immediately springs to mind. In late 1927, A.P. Carter met Lesley at a jam session held in east Tennessee that was hosted by John Henry Lyons. Immediately impressed with his skills on the guitar, A.P. hired Lesley on the spot to accompany him on song collecting trips. When they found someone willing to share an old song that the Carter family could record, A.P. wrote down the lyrics and Leslie memorized the melody. Upon returning to A.P.'s homeplace, they shared the songs they had found with Maybelle and Sarah. It was during those song sessions that Maybelle absorbed much of Lesley's guitar style. Once asked by Mike Seeger if he gave lessons to May-

belle, he replied, "No, I didn't have to. She would just watch and learn. She was that good."

Maybelle Carter went on to be the first musician in recorded country music to use the guitar as a lead instrument. It all started with "Bury Me Under Beneath the Weeping Willow Tree," which was the first song the Carter Family recorded on August 1, 1927. On this recording Maybelle used her signature way of playing rhythm and lead at the same time.

There's actually not much difference between the Carter Scratch and what's


commonly called the "Thumb-Brush" or the "Boom Chick." In both of these ways of picking, either the thumb or a pick alternates back and forth from one bass string to another. On the second part of

> this strum, the bottom three of four strings of the guitar are struck with a downward motion. With the Thumb Brush, the back of the fingernails are used. In flatpicking, the pick strums down on the strings. And in the Carter Scratch, the index finger is used to go down and up on the bottom three or four strings.

> Why not take the Carter Scratch for a trial run on your "scratch box," better known as a guitar. The illustration shows this legendary strum on a D chord. The arrows indicate the direction of the strum.

Collaboration Between KBEM and the Hook and Ladder

Every second Sunday January through April, KBEM-FM collaborates with the Hook and Ladder club in Minneapolis. Each time, we have presented a local "Roots" artist from 7-9 PM. On April 12, the show will be headlined by Corpse Reviver, a great group with a great concept: re-doing songs represented in the Harry Smith Collection of American Folk Music.

The Hook and Ladder is the perfect place to present great local music. The club has served the music community by providing space for local artists to present and grow. It has demonstrated curatorial acumen by creating show formats that fit the artists presented. The Hook and Ladder has also displayed a good degree of confidence in opening a new listening venue, the Mission Room. The combination of service, expertise and confidence despite negotiating difficult terrain gives The Hook a jaunty swagger and a good degree of hip. Hats off to the Hook and to the groups we are presenting and their audiences.

Corpse Reviver

Corpse Reviver is the fourth and final group to be presented by the collaboration between the Hook and KBEM. Corpse Reviver fits perfectly traditional music in the twenty-first century. A half century ago, there was a good deal of concern over the survival of old-time music. As a result, many old-time groups were set on preserving the music by performing songs as they had been played previously. But things no longer seem as precarious as they did then. Corpse Reviver does what a lot of old groups did: create their own spins on songs. They seem to have a great deal of fun putting out new arrangements and adaptations of old songs. But, of course, they also take delight it playing some songs the old ways, too. The group helps evolve a group of iconic songs that have appeared in the Harry Smith collection of American Folk Music. The show will be 7-9PM, Sunday April 12, 2020 at the Hook and Ladder in Minneapolis, www.thehookmpls.com. Sherry Minnick and Phil Nusbaum will supply a front set.

The Fund Drive

At the April 12 Corpse Reviver show, KBEM staffers will be celebrating the end of the spring 2020 fund drive. The drive affects Bluegrass Saturday Morning on April 4 and 11. The drive is always a bit of a grind, but staffers know that it comes with the territory. Doing a drive teaches you how to pace yourself. No fund drive could operate without a group of committed volunteers who answer phones and do a lot of other tasks.

But the main thing about a fund drive on public radio is reaching listeners with our message. I expect listeners to come through for bluegrass music on the radio, as they have in the past. Funds raised via pledges taken by phone or submitted via internet are used to pay for the nuts and bolts of radio production. That includes salaries for people, equipment and, well, nuts and bolts.

When you hear the requests for support, know that the need is real. Know, too, that KBEM-FM has a hefty slice of programming devoted to roots music traditions, a trend that was put into place as a result of listener support.

Bluegrass Saturday Morning is heard 7AM-12 noon weekly at 88.5 FM. More and more people are listening to the KBEM-FM stream, available at www.jazz8.fm. Also, the show is archived for two weeks after broadcast, so it's easy to get radio bluegrass any time. We hope listeners are enjoying the interviews with bluegrass performers recorded at World of Bluegrass in September 2019. These will continue to be broadcast till approximately the midpoint of 2020, in the midst of the Bluegrass Season.

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

Tab: Bull Run Picnic

This month's tune has an ironically cheerful melody. It was named after the first of two battles at Bull Run, also known as the Battles of Manassas, near Manassas Junction, Virginia. Manassas Junction happens to be near to our nation's capital, so the battle was witnessed in 1861 by a good number of Washington's inhabitants. The crowd left in carriages early that July morning with packed lunches, and they picnicked on the eastern slopes near the battlefield. They were expecting an easy Union victory. But by the afternoon, the Union army was driven back, and the roads to Washington were blocked by civilians fleeing in their carriages. The Union army also lost the second battle of Bull Run in 1862 to Robert E. Lee's army. The reality of war apparently precluded picnickers this time.

I could find only one online recording of "Bull Run Picnic." It is by Missouri fiddler Cy Kines (1907-1994) from the 1976 Old Time Fiddlers' Repertory University of Missouri LP. But you can also find a mandolin rendition of the tune by Peter Ostroushko backed up by Norman and Nancy Blake on Peter's The Mando Chronicles, Red House Records 2012. Peter precedes the tune with one of his own, "Proud Boys of Manassas." The medley is found on the first disc of his three disc recording, truly an essential recording for mandolin players of all types.

And as sometimes happens in traditional music, the same tune melody is found in an entirely different genre: French Canadian. Joseph Allard (1873– 1947) recorded the melody in a 1928 Victor 78 RPM recording under the name "Reel de Châteauguay." Since that is the earliest recording I've found available, my guess is that it predates the Bull Run Picnic recordings, with one interesting difference: the tune parts are reversed. You-Tube recordings may be found of Allard, along with other recordings by Canadian fiddlers such as Jean Carignan (1916-1988) and Don Messer (1909-1973).

So the added benefit of learning this month's tune is that besides learning a cheerful old time melody as shown here, if you reverse playing the parts, you've also learned a classic French-Canadian tune. Enjoy the melody either way!
